

Publication Ethics

Use this checklist to make sure you have adhered to best practices in research publishing. If you have any questions or require language or publishing support, please email global@edanzgroup.com.

Feature

• Safety and welfare

Prior ethics approval was obtained for animal/human studies (or waiver was obtained from an ethics committee); the Declaration of Helsinki was adhered to for human studies

Informed consent was given by human participants (or parents/guardians if minors) for study participation, or a waiver for the need for consent was obtained from an ethics committee

Informed consent was given by human participants (or parents/guardians if minors) as permission to publish data or images

Data from humans was kept confidential, secure, and anonymous

Sufficient attention was paid to ethical aspects of environmental, agricultural, plant, endangered species, and anthropological research

Sufficient attention was paid to "dual-use research of concern" (eg, could be misused to harm the public/environment); inform the journal at submission

Human clinical trials (prospective studies in which humans are assigned to groups) were preregistered in an online clinical trial registry such as www.ClinicalTrials.gov

Manuscript submission

Manuscript is not being submitted to more than one journal at a time

Corresponding author (and not a third party) is doing the submission, whether online or by email

All authors have approved of the final draft and the target journal, have agreed on authorship (including order) and who is the corresponding author, and have signed all necessary forms

All necessary forms (eg, conflicts of interest, transparency declaration, authorship/contributorship, copyright transfer if relevant, choice of Creative Commons license if relevant) have been signed

All necessary conditions have been met (eg, giving ORCID ID codes, permission from employer, copyright permission for reproduction or adaptation of copyrighted material)

• Originality, avoiding plagiarism

Check what the journal considers as already published; declare if any of the work has been previously presented, submitted, or published (including preprints and translations) and provide copies if requested

Explain if the study is a part of a larger study or one that uses the same dataset (to avoid overlapping, partially redundant, or salami publishing), and reference the other works and seek copyright permission if needed

Indicate if any parts are copyrighted and that copyright permission has been obtained (ie, provide copyright credit lines as a footnote for any reproduced or adapted text or illustrations)

If requested, declare if anti-plagiarism software has been used to check for text overlap and the score given by the software

Properly cite and reference sources; quote if reproducing text or else paraphrase/summarize/synthesize

• Data integrity, data sharing, and reproducibility

Keep raw data files for inspection and be prepared to submit it on request of the journal

Do not create, delete, or alter data (especially negative or unexpected data) or parts of images; include in the Discussion section a discussion of negative and unexpected findings

Use appropriate methods, analyses, and illustrations so as not to mislead readers

Provide a data availability/sharing statement

Provide a software/coding/materials sharing statement

Upload data files to a suitable repository if data sharing is mandated by a funder, institution, or journal

Upload special data (eg, genetic and protein sequences, macromolecular structures, microarray data, crystallographic data, proteomics data, zoological/biological names, fungi data, marine species, chemicals) to a suitable repository for public access/record and provide the accession number

Give enough detail in the Methods to allow replication, reference known methods, and upload or reference full protocols in repositories or supplementary files

For biomedical/life/social sciences, use the relevant reporting guidelines from the EQUATOR Network (https://www.equator-network.org/) and provide a checklist and flowchart as requested by the journal

If requested, declare whether all authors had access to the data during the preparation of the manuscript

Submit a trial or study summary or detailed analysis plan to show that the protocol, research endpoints, and hypothesis to be tested have not changed (to avoid cherry picking, p-hacking, data dredging/fishing expeditions, and HARK [hypothesizing after the results are known])

Authorship

Make sure all authors fulfill authorship criteria as defined by the journal (eg, four authorship criteria of the ICMJE guidelines at www.icmje.org, which include taking responsibility for the work)

List contributions of authors in the style and format required by the journal (eg, 14 items of the CASRAI CRediT nomenclature at https://casrai.org/credit/)

Declare if required by the journal that there are no guest/gift/honorary authors (added names) or ghost authors (missing names)

Do not change authorship or author order before or after publication without justification and correct application to the journal to do so, and with the signed consent of all authors

• Acknowledgments

Acknowledge people who are not authors who helped you (eg, donated materials, performed technical steps, gave editorial/artistic/administrative assistance), but obtain their written permission to be acknowledged

Editorial office's contact details, including full address, are provided

Conflicts of interest and funding source

Declare any financial or nonfinancial conflicts of interest that may bias the research or reporting; adhere to journal guidelines and definitions for types, timing, and financial amounts involved

Complete any conflicts of interest forms of the journal (eg, some use the ICMJE form at http://www.icmje.org/conflicts-of-interest/)

Declare if you had any financial support and name the funder; declare any role that the funder had in the study design, research, data analysis, interpretation, reporting, and publication

Peer review

Give truthful information if recommendations of reviewers/nonreviewers are allowed; state any conflicts of interest

Do not manipulate the peer review process in any way

Do not contact the reviewer without permission from the journal; do not offer authorship to the reviewer without appropriate written justification, permission from the journal, and agreement from the other authors; inform the journal if the identity of the reviewer becomes known during double-blind peer review

Keep peer review materials (including peer review reports) confidential unless permission is given by the journal and reviewer

Inform the journal if you suspect unethical peer review (eg, reviewer delaying review or making unreasonable requests on purpose, reviewer/editor requesting or requiring that irrelevant references be included, reviewer plagiarizing material from a submission, reviewer contacting the author directly without permission from the journal, reviewer wanting to add their name as an author)

• Referencing

Cite and reference correctly and honestly, so references reflect the sources actually used and they are not misquoted or misrepresented; make sure only references that are directly consulted/read are included in the reference list

Provide a complete reference list and do not omit key references or those that show opposite findings to yours; ensure the list is accurate to allow others to verify the sources

Do not include irrelevant references of sources published by you or your colleagues in an effort to artificially increase citation scores

Do not include unpublished personal communications in the References (eg, emails, speeches, conversations); instead, cite the source and format within the text in parentheses (after obtaining written permission for use)

• Postpublication ethics / general

Inform the journal if errors are discovered after publication and request correction/retraction if needed

Reply to the journal if it requests a reply to a reader's query or letter to the editor

Cooperate with the journal, institution, and funder in any prepublication or postpublication investigations

Adhere to journal/publisher embargoes for sharing the publication or issuing press/media releases; preparation of the latter should ensure that information from the publication is accurately conveyed and not extend beyond the findings

Adhere to local and national laws; adhere to industry guidelines (eg, ICMJE, GPP3, COPE)

Do not encourage or allow research or publishing misconduct; do not use paper mills or services to write papers for you; do not use unethical author and editorial services

Do not submit work to, act as editor/reviewer for, or cite predatory journals



Identifying Trusted Journals

Use this checklist to identify trusted journals (eg, after using the Edanz Journal Selector, http://www.edanzediting.com/journal_selector). The majority of features must be present and are based on items from the http://ThinkCheckSubmit.org checklist as well as the Principles of Transparency and Best Practice in Scholarly Publishing (found on http://www.publicationethics.org).
